The History of Dagbreek

The "Huis van Roem en Faam" has developed into a world of its own over a period of 100 years. When you enter the front door and move through the porch you will see the big square known as the Quad. This forms the centre of Dagbreek's activities and existence. The first thing you will notice is the well-known symbol which stands in the middle of the Quad:

The Eiffel


All over Dagbreek is associated with the Eiffel and the Eiffel with Dagbreek. It is our official symbol and forms part of our House emblem. This symbol also serves as the name of the House's official publications (The Eiffel), the third rugby side (The Eiffels) and our highly acclaimed serenade group (The Eiffel choir).

The Eiffel had meaning for the "Huis van Roem en Faam" before the 70's already. The original Eiffel was built by Koos du Pisani as a part of the float procession of 1954.

This presentation of the French Department was judged as the best entry. After the procession the Eiffel received an honorary place in the centre of the Quad.

In 1958, under the guidance of Willie Esterhuyse, then Primarius, the model was replaced with a replica. The previous Eiffel was built in 1962 by Roelf Hollenbach and Jan du Preez. In 2004, after years of service on the Quad and in our hearts, a new Eiffel (designed and built by Fanie en Abie Nel) was constructed to celebrate the original one's 50th anniversary.

On the emblem of Dagbreek the Eiffel stands in front of a rising sun. The sun is not only symbolic of Dagbreek's name, but as a symbol of light it is a sign of hope and trust Dabrekers have in each other and in others.



The House

The residence is built in the form of a square and consists of 17 occupied sections. Sections 1 to 7 make up the Senior House where students stay from their third year. The Junior House consists of Section 8 to 18 (Section 16 is the current dining hall).

The first and second years stay in double rooms in the Junior house. Dagbreek differs from other residences, because it is built with different sections consisting of four rooms and a bathroom for each floor. This style of building resulted in every section having their own unique character and traditions. The competition between sections is a characteristic of the House's daily activities.

Wynand Louw is the architect of Dagbreek. Building started in 1920 and was completed in 1921, but the residence only consisted of Section 1 to 7. The residents and students of Stellenbosch were astonished by the sheer size of the three story building. JD Conradie was the very first occupant and in the first year of the House's existence there were only 27 residents. Initially every resident had to prepare his own food.

This system did not work very well and in 1925 they began building Section 8 to 18. The new sections included a dining hall and a recreation hall.



This hall, Visholpark, was named after two previous residents, Visser and Hollenbach, who constructed the badminton court. Other areas include those of the House Committee room, prayer room, snooker room, washing room, post room, Dagbreek Club and the Archive. For the fitness fanatics there is also a well equipped gymnasium.


More than just Academics...

From the Archive


"The year is 1918. The Victoria College's status has just been increased to that of a university and was from then on known as the University of Stellenbosch. An acute housing shortage was quickly identified as prospective students from all over the South Africa came rushing to Stellenbosch for higher academic teaching. In 1920 the building process of the first seven sections of Dagbreek started which if viewed from above would have looked like the shape of the letter L, known to students as 'The New Residence' (Die Nuwe Koshuis). Students started moving into the residence even before the construction of the building had finished at the end of 1921.

Initially the university did not provide any food; and catering services, as we know them today, were few and far between. The first residents had to cook and provide every single meal for themselves. They received the nickname 'the starving men' (die hongerly). A representation of these challenging times can be seen in the form of pots and pans on the first Dagbreek Shield. Before long, the first 27 residents of 'The New Residence' under the leadership of the first primarius, Eben Greyling, decided on Dagbreek as the new name for the residence. It was symbolic of the new day or new period issued in, in the history of the University of Stellenbosch as Dagbreek was the first modern residence in Stellenbosch. Some might then ask where the double designation of The John Murray House and Dagbreek comes from.

The university was adamant on naming it after John Murray. Born in Graaff-Reinet John moved with his family at age 12 to Aberdeen, Scotland. In 1845 he and his brother travelled to the Netherlands to further their studies in theology. On arrival in South Africa in 1849 they quickly became well known for their biblical work in communities across South Africa.







The Evolution of the Dagbreek Shield

In 1859 John opened the theological seminary (kweekskool) at the University of Stellenbosch and devoted 24 years of his life to serving the institution. John Murray furthermore played influential roles in the infant years of both Paul Roos Gymnasium and Bloemhof Hoërskool located in Stellenbosch.

This left the residents of Dagbreek with a dilemma as the university would not budge on the new name. For seven years the residents of Dagbreek were persistent in their efforts and soon after they settled on the double designation, both with extra-ordinary meaning and value.

Over the last century however the four walls of Dagbreek served its purpose as onslaughts from several campus residences and even Ikeys's (University of Cape Town) residences came close to intimidating our residents, all of course in great university student spirit.

The history of Dagbreek is filled with tradition and memorable events. This should serve as a quick introduction to what many consider their favourite home. Dagbreek's silent renown lies in the achievements still to be accomplished as our intrinsic values drive us to lead with passion and integrity in order to produce well educated members of society that contribute to the improvement of South Africa."

Former Residents

During the past 100 years many Dagbrekers had a great influence in South Africa and became world renowned in their field.

One of the best known Old-Dagbrekers is the deceased Oom Koos Meyer who entertained many people with stories from his student life.

Dagbreek also delivered many Springbok rugby players such as Dawie Snyman (player and later coach), Jan Boland Coetzee, Kobus Burger, Faffa Knoetze, Colin Beck, Louis Koen, Kat Myburgh, Gaffie du Toit, Gio Aplon and Charl McCleod.

Other exceptional sportsmen include Tony Leon (Springbok-gymnast), Danie Malan (previous record holder in the 800m and 1500m) and De Villiers Lampbrecht (the first SA athlete to run the dream mile).

Dagbreek has delivered more than just sport stars. Various writers and famous singers lived in Dagbreek. WA de Klerk, FA Venter, Ettienne le Roux, Uys Krige and Ernest van Heerden (all acclaimed writers) and Bun Booyens (renowned academic).

In the business sector, Dagbreek boasts various entrepreneurs and leaders. For example, Louw Barnardt, who was named the 2018 Sanlam Emerging Business Entrepreneur of the Year.

Great emphasis is placed on tradition and so it is no surprise that several generations of families return to Dagbreek and choose this residence as their home.

Probably one of the biggest Dagbrekers is the late Bethuel Sibuta who worked as part of the kitchen staff for 47 years and lived here with many legends of his time. It is for this very reason that the dining hall is named after Bethuel himself, in order to celebrate his life and his contributions to the residence.


